Why a Local Union Label Committee?

- In accordance with the UAW Constitution Article 44, it is mandated that each local union of the UAW have a Union Label Committee.
- Article 54, Section 8 of the UAW Constitution states: "All Local Unions shall have an appointed or elected Union Label Committee that must function."

Why a Local Union Label Committee?



State and federal lawmakers try to impose increasingly restrictive labor laws that gnaw at the foundations of unionism. One of the best ways to counteract efforts to destroy organized labor is to buy union-made products and spend our union earnings for union services.







The Union Label committee helps emphasize the importance of supporting those goods and services produced by union members under Union-Won working conditions.

As a member of the Union Label Committee, your job is to make it as easy as possible for our members to find American-made Union products and services by providing the information they need to make intelligent and patriotic choices when making purchases or looking for services they may need.

Buying American-Made

<u>What is it?</u>

Purchasing a product made, built, or assembled, to a certain degree, in America. These companies' headquarters tend to be housed outside of the United States, and typically they pay little to no taxes to the U.S. Treasury Buying American-Made vs Buying American

Buying American

<u>What is it?</u>

Means we are buying an American-made product from an American-owned company which is headquartered in the United States. These companies create other American jobs not only by using a higher amount of domestic parts in their products but they also support other American jobs

The familiar "wheel" logo is the UAW's regular trademark.

- A local union must have permission from their Regional Director to put the UAW "wheel" logo or block-lettered "UAW" on T-shirts, hats, jackets, or other items promoting joint efforts.
- Your charter as a local includes a license to use this mark for "official" UAW purposes like bargaining and administering joint programs.





UAW Certification Mark

This is the mark that is used on products or their packaging to assure customers that this quality product is made by UAW members in a UAW-represented facility. The UAW Union Label is the official seal used for this purpose, and we should be proud to show it on all our products.



Some locals have their own "quality label" designed for their own specific worksite. The label includes the local union number and the name of the worksite.


