- Electing local union officers, delegates, and representatives.
- Participating in local union affairs and deciding policies and actions with majority votes.
- Voting on your contract.

UAW CORE VALUES

BUILD & MAINTAIN HIGH STANDARDS IN CONTRACTS

The benefits we have bargained for in our contracts for over 80 years have given UAW members and their families better lives. It isn't just about pay raises; but about quality of life and ensuring that future members have a seat at the table.

ALL ARE EQUAL

A fundamental principle of our union is that all people are equal, regardless of age, gender, race, ethnicity, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, skill, or education level. It was a struggle over whether unskilled labor had a right to be organized that led to our union's formation.

WE FIGHT FOR EVERYONE, NOT JUST OURSELVES

We are all connected. All working people deserve respect and dignity on the job and fair wages to raise families. But this goes beyond the workplace. It's about our communities and our country. We were there in 1963 with the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and the March on Washington. We supported Cesar Chavez and the United Farm Workers, and we advocated for the release of Nelson Mandela from imprisonment in South Africa.

BREAD BOX IS CONNECTED TO THE BALLOT BOX

Too often, the gains we make at the bargaining table are put in peril by Congress or state legislators. That is why our union has a robust political action program to protect members' interests, such as labor rights, workplace safety, and Social Security.

STANDING COMMITTEES

Citizenship and Legislative (also known as CAP): Acts as the political-legislative arm of our local unions.

Civil and Human Rights: Guards our "No Discrimination" policy and works to eliminate discrimination in the workplace and beyond.

Community Services: Assists members during worksite closings, strikes, layoffs, and other hardships.

Conservation and Recreation: Provides recreation activities and educates members on the importance of protecting our environment.

Constitution and Bylaws: Helps locals review and revise bylaws and helps to set operational rules.

Consumer Affairs: Ensures members consume safe and honest products and provides education on consumer pitfalls.

Education: Works with local union leadership to provide classes, materials, and information to help build our union's power.

Organizing: Our locals need a committee that can provide the resources and strategies to other workers who want to join our union.

Union Label: Educates members about the products and services we buy and encourages people to buy union-made.

Veterans: Advocates for all active and retired UAW veterans through leadership, guidance, and education.

Women's: Provides leadership and training for women to get active in their locals and rise to leadership positions.
